

# Children's Behavioral Health Parent Survey for Youth Empowerment Services Trainings

**Results and Analysis** 

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### Background

### **Purpose of Survey**

As the Workforce Development and Training Workgroup moved forward with training plans, it became apparent that we needed to hear from parents from across the state to assess their desires and needs as they apply to the types of trainings and methods to be utilized so parents could receive information and education on the YES program.

### Method for Developing Survey

A couple of Workgroup members, along with Division of Behavioral Health Central Office staff, developed questions for a survey that would go out to parents/caregivers of children throughout Idaho. These questions were then vetted through the entire Workgroup whose membership includes parents, Idaho's Parent Network for Children's Mental Health, and the Department's Public Office of Information.

Once approved, the survey was made available online and via hard copy and email, if requested. The survey was announced through multiple sources via websites, newsletters, social media, email and in-person conversations. These sources included, but were not limited to:

The survey was open for responses from March 28, 2018 through April 30, 2018. On May 1st, the survey was taken down, and the results were compiled and analyzed.

### Summary

### **Purpose**

The IDHW, along with other partners (the Department of Juvenile Corrections and the State Department of Education), is in the process of implementing a settlement agreement plan that will transform the children's mental health system. The implementation plan includes training parents and caregivers about the new system of care, services and how to access these services. The plan also speaks to engaging families in outreach and educating other stakeholders.

This survey was meant to provide an opportunity for parents/caregivers to share their thoughts and ideas regarding the approach to engaging, educating and involving parents/caregivers in the training process.

#### Methods

Surveys were distributed in both paper form and electronically. The survey was released on March 28, 2018 and the requested completion date was April 30, 2018.

### Respondents

Respondents were overwhelmingly from the Treasure Valley, with 58.5% of respondents from Ada and Canyon counties alone. This suggests the results could be biased and may not accurately represent the opinions of the state as a whole.

Email (29.2%) and Social Media (26.2%) were the most common ways respondents reported hearing about the survey.

Over half of all respondents (50.8%) were not aware of Idaho's new children's mental health system of care known as Youth Empowerment Services (YES) and several expressed that though they were aware of it, they would like to know more. The vast majority (84.6%) of respondents have not attended a YES Foundations Training in-person or by webinar in which an overview of the system was presented.

#### Results

The most common choice for the way respondents would like to learn or receive training about YES was through face-to-face interaction: a one-on-one discussion with an appropriate member of their child's treatment team (53.9%), and in-person training with a question and answer section (49.2%).

Overwhelmingly, respondents were interested in what services are available for their child now (89.2%), and what new services look like (81.5%). Respondents also expressed interest in learning more about what they can expect from the YES system and services, becoming eligible for YES, and the assessment process.

Most respondents (86.2%) expressed they are likely or highly likely to participate in trainings and education if they were offered as one-on-one discussion with an appropriate team member of their child's treatment team. However, all training modalities were reasonably popular, with over 50% of respondents saying they would be likely or highly likely to participate in webinars, in-person training, and panel discussions.


Respondents were likely to report needing evening options (55.4%) and/or child care (52.3%) to participate in educational opportunities and trainings.

Most respondents stated that the most effective way of getting information about education and training was email (81.5%). More than half of respondents also reported that direct mail is an effective option (53.9%).

67.7% of respondents reported that they would be interested in pursuing a Parent Support leadership role if given the appropriate training, however just 15 of the 44 respondents (34.1%) expressed interest in leadership training previously in Question 4 {What specific topics related to YES would you like to know about (either more about those listed here or something else)? }

### Zip Code and County of Residence of Respondents

Respondents were overwhelmingly from the Treasure Valley, with 58.5% of respondents from Ada and Canyon counties alone.









## 2. Have you attended a YES Foundations Training in-person or by webinar in which an overview of the system was presented?

The vast majority (84.6%) of respondents have not attended a YES Foundations Training in-person or by webinar in which an overview of the system was presented.




Interestingly, there was one respondent who answered "No" to question 1, but "Yes" to question 2; suggesting they have attended a YES Foundation Training but are not aware of YES.

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# 3. Other than the information you can access from the YES website (<a href="http://youthempowermentservices.idaho.gov/">http://youthempowermentservices.idaho.gov/</a>), what are other ways you like to learn or ways you would appreciate receiving training about YES?

The most common choices for the way respondents would like to learn or receive training about YES was through face-to-face interaction: a one-on-one discussion with an appropriate member of their child's treatment team (53.9%), and in-person training with a question and answer section (49.2%).




Though most respondents expressed interest in a one-on-one discussion with an appropriate memeber of their child's treatment team and in-person training with a question and answer session, there was only a modest overlap between these two responses. This suggests that a combination of these two options would satisfy approximately 2/3rds of those who responded.

Most respondents are interested in both current and future services.




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
## 5. If trainings and education were offered on the topics listed in the previous question, or other topics related to YES, how likely are you to participate in them?

Most respondents (86.2%) expressed they are likely or highly likely to participate in trainings and education if they were offered as one-on-one discussion with an appropriate team member of their child's treatment team. However, all training modalities were reasonably popular, with over 50% of respondents saying they would be likely or very likely to participate in webinars, in-person training, and panel discussions.


5 a. Webinars




5 b. In-Person Training



Just 3 respondents did not report being Highly Likely or Likely to participate in either a webinar or a one-on-one discussion with an appropriate member of their child's treatment team. 
### 6. What supports would you need to participate in educational opportunities or trainings listed in previous questions?

Respondents were likely to report needing evening options (55.4%) and/or child care (52.3%) to participate in educational opportunities and trainings.



### 7. What are the most effective ways of getting information about education and training out to families/you?

Most respondents stated that the most effective way of getting information about education and training was email (81.5%). More than half of respondents also reported that direct mail is an effective option (53.9%).




Counselor's Offices

Posters, I have found most of my connections through posters in community. Handouts - something I can put in my notebook until a need arises.



If given the appropriate training, what types of leadership roles would you be interested in pursuing?


67.7% of respondents reported that they would be interested in pursuing a Parent Support leadership role if given the appropriate training.



### 9. How did you hear about this survey?

Email (29.2%) and Social Media (26.2%) were the most common ways respondents reported hearing about the survey.

Respondents chose email as the most effective way of getting information about education and training in Question 7, regardless of how they heard about this survey.
